Paper submissions are due on the **last Friday in January by 5:00 PM**. We encourage students **not** to wait until the deadline to submit the paper. The Journal will be released in April.

The student needs only to send the double-spaced original research paper in 12-pt font, in .doc format, and in English to gender@nd.edu as soon as it is finished.

They should also include in the email:

- The student's name
- The title of his or her paper
- The name of any other publication where the submission is being considered

Written submissions should be 10-40 pages in length and must represent original scholarship by the author that has not been previously published. All submissions will be vetted by the Journal's editorial board, which is comprised of various members of the Gender Studies Honor Society. It will select a range of papers and/or artistic works that will represent gender scholarship across disciplines and departments. The John J. Reilly Center Program in the History and Philosophy of Science *Presents:* **"Values and Voluntarism"**

Abstract: If belief is (in some sense and to some degree) a matter of the will, what role do so-called non-epistemic values play in belief formation? In examining this question, I shall focus on a handful of figures, including Otto Neurath, Bas van Fraassen, and Helen Longino.

Neurath has been described by Thomas Uebel as an epistemic voluntarist on account of the role he assigns to auxiliary motives as an external criterion of theory choice. Here I shall briefly rehearse my reasons for thinking that Uebel (in some respects) misrepresents Neurath's position, especially with respect to the values question. Bas van Fraassen's epistemic voluntarism is quite different from the version ascribed to Neurath and has assumed greater and greater importance in the development of his thought – from its introduction in the important paper 1984 JP article called "Belief and the Will" to its present explicitly Sartrean formulation. I shall examine the historical antecedents of van Fraassen's voluntarism, its development since 1984, and (briefly) the relationship of his epistemic voluntarism to his empiricist philosophy of science. I shall also wave my hands at the existentialist account of values and emotions that seems to inform the epistemic voluntarism. Finally, there is the question whether some feminist accounts of science should be described as "voluntarist" insofar as they explicitly endorse certain value commitments as determinants of model choice. Helen Longino doesn't self-identify as a voluntarist, but her contextual empiricism will be the central example here because of its sophistication and because it shares some of the classically empiricist commitments of Neurath and van Fraassen.

Ordinary Blackness: On the Aesthetics of *Medicine for Melancholy* Kinohi Nishikawa, Assistant Professor of English November 8 at Noon in 339 O'Shaughnessy

A standard observation in the study of race in American cinema holds that black subjects have been rendered invisible or hypervisible by the white gaze. Based on the perception of embodied racial difference, these seemingly contradictory positions have combined to obscure black filmic subjectivity as a seen-but-not-seen form of representation. *Medicine for Melancholy* (Barry Jenkins, 2009) challenges the very terms by which the invisibility-hypervisibility paradox has held sway over discussions of race and cinema. Abjuring the need to "correct" past iterations of black filmic subjectivity, or to put on display a "new" version of black identity, *Medicine for Melancholy* envisions blackness as ordinary—that is, an object whose very banality frustrates efforts to read onto its surface representation. The film achieves this by rendering black sexuality, long a target of the white gaze, as the mere unfolding of sequential images that produce desire.

Kinohi Nishikawa earned his Ph.D. in Literature and Certificate in Feminist Studies from Duke and is Assistant Professor of English and Research Faculty in Gender Studies. His research focuses on modern African American print and visual cultures, with an emphasis on cinema, book design, and popular literature. His book manuscript is titled *Reading the Street: Black Pulp Fiction in Post-Civil Rights America*.

On March 20-21, 2013, the University of St. Thomas in Minnesota will be hosting a two-day program continuing a conversation begun by feminist legal scholars and theologians in the recently published collection of essays by feminists of a wide variety of religious perspectives, *Feminism, Law, and Religion* (Ashgate Press 2013, Failinger, Schiltz and Stabile eds). The book's authors and others will be exploring the role that theology and religious law from various religious traditions can play in construing and critiquing just law throughout the world. Midwest Undergraduate Conference in Gender Studies - call for papers

The University of Notre Dame, along with co-sponsors Saint Mary's College and Indiana University-South Bend, will host an undergraduate conference for Gender Studies on April 4 & 5, 2014 on Notre Dame's campus in South Bend, Indiana. We invite submissions focusing on any area of original research-based scholarship in gender studies (including, but not limited to, work in literary criticism, sociology, theology, anthropology, economics, psychology, biology) from colleges and universities in the Midwest. Presentations should take the form of 15 minutes presentations (with or without visual support, like PPTs and posters). We welcome scholarship that deals with the significance of gender—and the cognate subjects of sex, sexuality, race, ethnicity, class, religion, and nationality—in all areas of human life, especially in the social formation of human identities, practices, and institutions.

Students will need a faculty mentor from their field of research to offer guidance as the student develops and carries out the research project.

This conference will consist of a series of individual panels of 3-4 papers. A panel comprised of faculty from Notre Dame's Gender Studies Program, Saint Mary's Gender and Women's Studies Program, and Indiana's Women's and Gender Studies department will select papers from among the proposals received and constitute the panels.

Lunch (both days) and dinner (Friday) will be provided. There will be no registration fee for participants selected to present work. It is expected that all participants will attend the entire conference.
